Water Quality Monitoring on the Ulao Creek

The Ulao Creek waterway looks a lot different these days than it did in the past. The creek has been influenced by many different human interventions. These include the construction of the railroad, interstate 43, straightening of the river bed, bridges, culverts, farming, and introduction of invasive plants such as reed canary grass.

These changes have affected the Ulao Creek in many different ways. The stream flow and the water quality has certainly been negatively altered. In the past, northern pike had been able to travel up the creek from the Milwaukee River and spawn. The UCP is determined to improve the water quality of the Ulao Creek, allowing the northern pike back up the creek again.

Now a days, many good things are happening to the creek. Ecological understanding and awareness of the value of the creek has increased, building practices have become much more sensitive to control erosion and pollution into the creek. Exciting new projects are also underway at the county level to improve fish passage in the creek.

With all of these positive steps underway, The Ulao Creek Partnership is pleased to announce that we have started a water quality monitoring initiative. Water quality is affected by watershed practices and land uses. Stream monitoring offers an opportunity for us to learn about the water quality of the Ulao Creek and how our actions can affect the creek.

Our goal is to document the current characteristics of the water so that we can recognize changes in the future and see if the water quality is improving. The UCP has partnered with the Milwaukee Riverkeeper organization for this monitoring program. Milwaukee Riverkeeper has setup a watershed-wide network of trained citizen volunteers who monitor streams and rivers, collecting information in a consistent and useable format. Water quality data is collected by Water Action Volunteers, and are then entered to a web-based database. Anyone with access to the web can view data or compare results between sites or over time at a single site using the graphing functions of the database.

In May of 2009 August Hoppe participated in a day long training session sponsored by Milwaukee Riverkeeper at the Riveredge Nature Center to become a level 1 Water Action Volunteer. Once his training was completed, August Hoppe



then went out and started monitoring the Ulao Creek on his family's property in the Town of Grafton. Six parameters are included as part of the monitoring program. Between April and October, temperature, dissolved oxygen, stream flow, and transparency are monitored monthly. The aquatic and streamside habitat as well as the stream's macroinvertebrate community, are also monitored using a biotic index.

Dissolved oxygen—Measuring of the level of oxygen dissolved in the water is important since aquatic life depends on it.

Temperature—Water temperature changes can affect aquatic life, causing greater demand for oxygen or limiting survival of organisms.

- *Turbidity*—A measure of water clarity, including effects of both particles in the water and its color.

- *Stream flow*—The amount of water flowing past a point over a set period of time.

- *Habitat*—Assessing streambank, bed, and riparian vegetation can tell us if habitat is suitable for aquatic organisms.

- *Stream macroinvertebrate life*—Insects, worms, crustaceans, clams, etc. that are visible without the aid of a microscope are used to assess water quality based on their tolerance to various levels of dissolved oxygen.

We are excited about the upcoming water quality monitoring season. Starting this April the Ulao Creek Partnership will be at it again. Results from 2009 monitoring and our future monitoring this year can be found at the Water Action Volunteer's online database located at

Everyone knows Ozaukee County is rich in natural sites and resources, but most people have seen only a few of these up close. This day will change that with a wonderful celebration that invites everyone to come and discover what lies beyond.


Treasures of Oz will provide great opportunities for photos, birding, biking and geocaching as well as hiking, taking in the fresh air and getting a little smarter. The adventure ends for the day with food, music, a silent auction and a chance to win prizes. Ulao Creek Partnership is hooking up with a team of environmentally focused local organizations to create this day of celebration and education. This is the plan for the day:

1. Participants will visit selected treasure sites around the county from 9:00 a.m. until 3 p.m. using a map and a passport they can download at www.treasuresofoz.org. The Interurban Trail is a great resource for biking to the various sites and the trail map and suggested site routes will be available on the website.
2. Each site will have docents and volunteers to offer information about the site and its theme. Passports will be stamped at each site and the passports can be exchanged for raffle tickets. Bicycle riders can get an additional stamp near the new trail bridge over I-43, or at Mequon Nature Preserve or at Forest Beach. This stamp is worth additional raffle tickets.
3. The Treasures celebration will take place at Forest Beach Migratory Preserve from 1:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. There will be informational tables from partner organizations, sponsors and more. There will be a silent auction (1:00 - 4:00) to benefit OWLT and the Interurban Bridge and/ or to provide start up funds for Treasures for next year. There will be bluegrass and rock 'n roll music by String-a-Long and local vendors will have food available.

Treasure sites include the Mequon Nature Preserve, Highland Woods, BrattWoods, Lion's Den Gorge, the Cedarburg Bog, Riveredge Nature Center, Huiras Lake, Forest Beach Migratory Preserve, Harrington Beach State Park and the Interurban Trail.
